




A New Path for the Right to Health?

More Money, Less Health

- US spent a total of \$2.5 trillion on healthcare or approximately 18% of GDP (2009).
- 37th among all nations due to race and income disparities
- 17% of Americans did not have health insurance coverage



Percent of Nonelderly Uninsured Population Varied Widely (2004)




There is No U.S. Health Care System

Private (largely employer-based)

Public (Medicare and Medicaid)

Single Payer (Veterans)



Uniqueness of the U.S. System

- Lack of a central agency
- Lack of universal access
- An imperfect market
- The presence of thirdparty insurers and multiple payers



- Progressives supported the idea of national health insurance.
- Link between health of nation and health of its people.
- First credible movement towards a rights based approach.


